

What was the world like in 1950?

Television

There was only one channel to watch and that was the BBC. This channel is now called BBC 1. It was to be September 1955 before another channel started, and then only in London at first. This was ITV. All programmes were broadcast in black and white. The first regular colour television programme was transmitted in November 1969.

Home entertainment

Portable radios had not been invented. Huge radios and television sets with very small screens worked with valves, which took several minutes to warm up. Record players were available, but tape recorders, cassettes, CDs, iPods, mp3 players, video recorders, DVDs and home computers did not exist. The Internet only became available in 1988, but it was to be another ten years before many homes were connected.

Money

There was a different currency. Twelve pennies made a shilling, and twenty shillings made a pound. The decimal coins, where a hundred pennies make a pound, were introduced in February 1971.

Roads

There were no speed limits on roads outside of towns, but cars could rarely reach speeds of more than 50 or 60 mph. There were no motorways at all, the first was to be part of the M6 near Preston, opened in November 1959.

Buses

Buses had a crew of two people, the driver and the conductor. It was the conductor's job to ring the bell (once for "next stop, please", twice for "go" and three times for "keep going, the bus is full"). The conductor carried a ticket machine, and collected the fares from the passengers.
